1. This Society shall called "Trawden & District Agricultural Society"
2. The Directors of the Society shall consist of Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Treasurer and General Secretary.
3. The Officers of the Society shall consist of President, Chairman, Vice Chairman, Treasurer, General Secretary, Show Manager and Committee; Five to form a quorum.
4. All Directors and Officers shall be elected annually at the General meeting of the Society, which shall be held on such a day and at such a place as the Society may appoint.
5. The affairs of the Society and the application of its funds shall be under the management of the Committee, who will settle all matters that may be in dispute.
6. The Society reserves the right to cancel or amalgamate any class with insufficient entries.
7. All exhibitors do so subject to the Rules and Regulations laid down by the Society. If a dispute arises for which no special rule is laid down, same shall be referred to the Directors and Officers, whose decision shall be final.
8. Show Secretaries shall not in any way disclose or make known to any person whatsoever, until the day of the show, the names of the competitors for any prizes.
9. All exhibits are displayed at Owners Risk. The Society will accept no responsibility for loss, damage, accident of theft.
10. Prize winning stock to be paraded when called upon, or forfeit prize money and/or trophy.
11. All entries to be presented at times stated by Section Secretary.
12. Any Exhibitors Assistant not in possession of an Entrance Ticket must pay the full admission fee.

(you will need a microwave)
 - 375g Unsalted Butter
 - 75g Caster Sugar
 - 225g Plain Flour
 - 397g Can of Sweetened Condensed Milk
 - 4 Tablespoons of Golden Syrup
 - 325g Plain Chocolate
 - 1 x 23cm Square Brownie tin or similar – greased and the bottom lined

Method

Pre heat the oven to Gas mark 3/170c

Base

Put the flour and the sugar into a bowl and rub in 175g of the butter and form a ball of dough.
Press this sandy mixture into the tin and smooth with either hands or spatula.

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Prick it with a fork and cook for 5mins, then lower the oven to gas mark 2/150c and cook for a further 30 – 40 mins until pale golden and no longer doughy.
Let it cool in the tin

Filling

Melt the remaining 200g butter in the microwave for 2-3mins
Add the golden syrup and condensed milk
Whisk the mixture well, until the butter is thoroughly incorporated
Heat for 6 – 7mins until boiling, stirring thoroughly ever minute (other wise it will burn)
It is ready when it has thickened and turned a light golden brown.
Pour this mixture over the cooled shortbread and leave to set

Topping

Break the chocolate into pieces and melt in a bowl in the microwave
Pour and spread over the caramel mixture (the less you touch it the shinier it will be)
Leave to cool
Once cooled cut the caramel shortbread into pieces and store in the fridge
Makes about 24

- 2 large oranges
- 6 eggs lightly beaten
- 250g of ground almonds
- 250g caster sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder

Pre heat oven to 190c

Method

Boil the oranges in a saucepan barely covered in water for 2 hours (you can do this the night before)
Once cooled cut the oranges open remove any pips and chop into rough segments including the rind
Butter and flour a 24cm springform cake tin

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Blend the oranges and eggs in a food processor
Mix the sugar, ground almonds and baking powder together in a bowl
Add the orange mixture and whisk it all together until fully combined
Pour the mixture into the cake tin
Bake for 45 mins to an hour
Once cooked turn out onto a cake rake and icing sugar
It should be dense and moist and could be served as a desert course

Pre heat the oven to gas mark 3\170c/325f

Method

First make the caramel
Dissolve 85g/3ozs of the sugar into 120ml/4fluid ozs of water bring to a rapid boil, do not stir the sugar syrup after it has boiled
When it starts to brown watch it carefully and tip the pan gently so the caramel turns an even gold.
Pour the caramel quickly into five or six ramekins or other small baking dishes, which you have just rinsed in cold water. Swill the caramel a little to coat the sides.
Put the milk into a saucepan and add the lemon zest, rest of the sugar and the cinnamon stick or vanilla pod
Heat to just below boiling point when small bubbles start forming around the edge of the pan, reduce the heat to very low and leave the milk to infuse for 5 mins
Beat the eggs and egg yolk together in a bowl, pour on the milk stirring all the time
Strain the mixture into the ramekins on top of the caramel
Put the dishes into a bainmarie and bake for about 15 mins

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Test the custard to see if it is cooked by sliding in the point of a knife, if it makes a clean cut the custard is ready

Allow to cool for some hours before turning out onto a serving dish

- 32. Bottle of Elderflower Cordial** – made to the following recipe
 - 20-30 freshly picked heads of elderflower
 - Zest of 2 lemons and 1 orange
 - Up to 1.5kg granulated or caster sugar
 - Up to 200ml freshly squeezed lemon juice (3-5 lemons, depending on juiciness)
 - Tartaric acid (optional)

Method

Shake any insects off the elderflowers, then place them in a large bowl with the lemon and orange zest and pour over enough just-boiled water to cover them completely (about 1 1/2-2 litres). Cover and leave for at least 4 hours, or overnight, until cold. Strain the liquid through muslin, a clean cotton cloth or jelly bag, gently squeezing it to extract all the juice. Measure the amount of liquid and pour it into a saucepan. To every 500ml liquid, add 350g sugar, 50ml lemon juice and a heaped teaspoon of tartaric acid if you are using it. Heat gently to dissolve the sugar, stirring occasionally. Bring to a gentle simmer and skim off any scum. Let the cordial cool, and then strain once again through muslin, cotton or a jelly bag. Pour the cordial through a funnel into clean bottles, filling them to within about 2-3cm of the top. Seal the bottles with screw-tops or corks. (Alternatively you can freeze it in small plastic containers). To serve, dilute to taste with ice-cold water – at least 5:1 water to cordial.

Rules of Entry:

1. Each entry must have title and class written on the back of the mount, (do not write name of front of mount)
2. All prints must be mounted, mount sizes as follows Minimum mount size 7" x 5", Maximum mount size 10" x 12". There is no minimum print size so long as mount size is as above
3. Entries may have been taken with a digital or with a film camera, but may not have been manipulated except in Class 66 in which a before and after photograph are required.

Conditions of Entry:

1. **Entries** – must close at 5.00pm on Thursday **4th August 2011**, and should be on the official entry form, you can download extra forms from the website. Entrants wishing to compete for the family trophy (see No 9 below) must list all members of the family (adult & junior) whose entries will count on the entry form, although every effort will be made to deal with minor changes to entries. Unfortunately **no late entries** can be accepted.
2. **Exhibits** – must be the work of the entrant. No kits are accepted as entries.
3. **Delivery** – entries must be brought to the Junior section marquee on the showground, labelled and benched, either a) between 4:00pm and 5:00pm on Saturday 13th August 2011 or b) between 8:30am and 9:30am on Show Day, Sunday 14th August 2011. Any particularly large items or multiple entries, for example schools or group entries, may be delivered by prior arrangement.
4. **Entry Fee** – there is no entry fee for any junior, but there is no free entry to the show for junior entrants.
5. **Age** – the entrant must be the appropriate age for the class on Show Day. The exhibit must have been created in the previous twelve months.

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Boulsworth Fell Race

Boulsworth Hill looms large over Trawden Showground and the 2010 Trawden & District Agricultural Show hosted the first Boulsworth Fell Race in its History.

Trawden AC organise the race, which forms part of the Pendle and Burnley Grand Prix series of races.

A total of 98 runners took part in the inaugural race with the winning male being Gary Shaw of Clayton Le Moors Harriers and the winning lady being local lady Molly Ralphson of Trawden AC.

This year the race is the last of the 12 Grand Prix Races, with Pendleside Hospice being the chosen charity for the 25th anniversary of the Grand Prix.
